
## City Projects Update

As summer approaches, we would like to update residents on some of the capital projects Heber City will be involved in this year. The following is a brief summary:

**Daniels Road Widening:** Daniels Road will be widened this summer and a storm drain installed, thanks in part to additional funding secured by the City from a Federal grant through UDOT. Affected areas are from approximately 1300 South to 2100 South. This project will enhance safety in an area that is seeing increased traffic and congestion each year. Pedestrian safety will also be improved with a new sidewalk being installed on the east side of the road.



Court needs. A concept layout of the building has now been developed and detailed design is beginning. A Construction Manager / General Contractor, Hogan & Associates, has also been retained to assist in the procurement and management of the building construction.

## Heber Valley Animal Services Friendly Reminder

With spring upon us, Heber Valley Animal Services would like to remind all dog owners of Heber City's leash law. The leash law was enacted to protect your pet and community members from dangers such as being hit by a passing vehicle, chasing children, other animals, and vehicles, damaging neighbor's property, and creating nuisances within our community. A shock collar or a training collar does not constitute a leash. The leash must be a nylon, leather, rope, or retractable leash. **Broadhead Water Tank Roof Replacement:** The Broadhead Tank supplies water to the west side of the City. The roof on this tank has slowly been deteriorating over the years and failed in some locations. The City began replacement of this roof this spring and will complete the work in June.

**Valley Hills Tank Water Lines:** Design has begun and construction is anticipated to start later this summer on new water lines in Valley Hills Blvd. These master planned lines will reconfigure the water system in the Valley Hills and eastern portions of the City to increase pressures at higher elevations, better utilize storage, increase operating efficiencies, and provide additional capacity.

**Public Safety Building:** The City anticipates beginning construction in August on the new Public Safety Building located on the same block as the current police station and old Central school building. The architect, GSBS, has assisted the City in assessing existing and future Public Safety and



## Where Can I Store My Old Cars, Trucks, RV's and Trailers?

As we begin clean-up of our yards this spring and summer, you may see an older, inoperable vehicle sitting in the yard. "What should I do with it?" you might ask yourself. There may be some attachment to it because it was your father's, or son's, or your very first car. It may hold many fond memories of days gone by, but does keeping it around really have value?



Heber City Ordinance will allow you to keep inoperable vehicles only under certain conditions. The Municipal Code reads as follows: It shall be unlawful to park, store, or leave or permit the parking, storing, or leaving of any licensed or unlicensed motor vehicle of any kind or part or parts thereof, which is in a wrecked, junked, partially dismantled, inoperative, or abandoned condition, whether attended or not, upon any private or leased property within the Heber City limits for or a period of time in excess of seven days, (a)

except that not more than (2) such vehicles or parts thereof may be stored if within a building, or placed behind an opaque screening fence not located in the front or required side lot areas.

So what does that really mean to you? You cannot have more than two inoperative vehicles on your property, and they must be located within a garage or behind a sight-obscuring fence in the back yard.

What should I do if I am not in compliance with the city code? Take photos and write remembrances of the good-old times spent with these old friends. Then, consider donating your vehicles to one of the many charitable organizations that accept old cars. Many of these organizations will come to your property and haul your vehicles away for you at no cost, and give you a receipt for your tax deductible donation.

One final reminder.....parking on landscaping is prohibited. Please park your vehicles in your yard on approved parking material, such as, gravel, cement, or blacktop, not your front lawn, planter strip, or your neighbor's landscaping.



Your efforts to keep the city beautiful are greatly appreciated.
