MAYOR MCDONALD'S 125TH ANNIVERSARY ADDRESS

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome everyone to Heber's 125th anniversary celebration of the founding of our beautiful city. After looking around Heber Valley, I'm sure you will agree that our City has come a long way since our founding fathers came into this valley over 125 years ago. Throughout the years that I have lived here, I have seen our city evolve and develop into what it is today.

On the stand today we have an honored guest from our city; a gentleman that has lived in this valley for 100 years, and is therefore the oldest known living citizen of Heber City. I would like to welcome and introduce to you Mr. Don Hicken. Mr. Hicken's family has put together a short tribute about Mr. Hicken's life in Heber City that I would like to share with you.

Don Leroy Hicken, was born January 10, 1914 in Heber City, Utah, to Joseph Claudius Hicken and Verna May Mahoney. He had one brother, Cyril Hicken and three sisters; Venice Watson, Nelda Rawlinson and Yvonne Horner. He married Mima Broadbent in June of 1936. They had two sons, Lynn Hicken and Dee Hicken. Don worked with his father and family in the poultry business. They had 16 chicken coops with 300 chickens per coop. He remembers gathering eggs twice a day. He and his Dad started Heber Truck Line, the first trucking company in Heber. He made the daily trip to Provo for years. He drove from the time he was a young teenager until he was 99 years old. He worked with his family in the Hicken Feed and Produce Company until he was called on an LDS mission. Don left his wife and two young boys to serve a mission in the Eastern States. Mima started teaching school to support the family and Don's mission. When Don returned home he continued to operate Heber Truck Line and also started the Heber Valley Floral Company. Don served as a Bishop in the LDS Church. He and Mima also served a mission together in Fiji. Don has been an important part of Heber and its history.

I would like to present Mr. Hicken with the Key to Heber City. The key to the City is the highest form of

honor a citizen can receive from the city. The key is an expression of our gratitude for Don's outstanding service to the City during his 100 years in this valley. It is a symbol of respect, honor and trust.

It is wonderful to see so many people come out to celebrate this historical event. This celebration is certainly a moment that we should all cherish and savor. Today is about reflecting on those who have gone before us, enjoying the present, and looking forward to what we can do for our city tomorrow and into the future.

During my time as a city councilman and a mayor of Heber, I have seen many acts of love and service that demonstrate the character of our wonderful community. These acts of kindness are much more than just services provided by the city. DANIELS ROAD RECONSTRUCTION UPDATE HIGHWAY 189 TO 2200 SOUTH

The Daniels Road reconstruction project, which began on September 2nd, will fully reconstruct the existing roadway from Highway 189 to 2200 South. Reconstruction of the road will include new asphalt, road widening, the addition of drainage and drainage systems, new signs and striping, widened shoulders and new curb, gutter and sidewalks in some areas. The entire area will be under construction and as many as three construction crews can be working simultaneously.

Please be cautious in this area! Expect delays – traffic will only be allowed one-way through the construction area with flaggers directing the traffic. Construction work will generally take place 6 days a week, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. The project is expected to shut down for the winter at the beginning of November, and then crews will return for final paving in the spring of 2015.
