**HELP YOUR DRAIN:
NO GREASE OR DEBRI DOWN THE
DRAIN**

Most homes and businesses in Heber are connected to a sewer system that carries their wastewater to a treatment plant. There are items that when put into the sewer system cause problems in the sewer lines and at the wastewater treatment plant. These problems can cause blockages that impact your home or place of business, increase treatment costs by putting upward pressure on sewer rates, and possibly impacting the environment. Provided below are some helpful hints that can reduce the likelihood of blockages, control treatment costs, and prevent undesirable environmental impacts.

Sewer Lines: The efficient flow of wastewater from your home and/or business to the treatment plant is dependent upon a network of sewer lines. Unwanted blockages can occur when disposing of grease, oils or fats in your sinks or drains. Grease doesn't disappear when you rinse it down the sink, it actually sticks to the inside of sewer pipes. The grease builds up over time and can completely block sewer pipes, causing raw sewage to back up into homes and businesses. Please avoid pouring grease down sinks or drains, rather pour grease into steel cans, milk cartons, or frozen juice containers to let the grease harden and then throw it in the trash.

The **ONLY** thing that should go down the toilet is human waste and toilet paper. The following items should not go down the toilet: disposable diapers, cleaning wipes of any kind, paper towels, feminine personal hygiene products, cotton balls, cotton swabs, facial tissues, floss, bandages, bandage wrappings, razor blades, needles, or disposal toilet brushes.

Wastewater Treatment Plant: The treatment plants rely on a series of mechanical and biological processes for treating wastewater. These processes are designed to improve and purify the water, making it fit to reuse or discharge back into the environment.



These mechanical and biological processes can be impaired when chemical wastes are disposed of in the sewer system. The following items should never be disposed of in the sewer system: medications or controlled substances, car fluids such as oils, anti-freeze or other automotive chemicals, concentrated alcohols, latex and oil paints, and non-household chemicals. Please help us manage your sewer system to prevent undesired consequences. Should you have any questions, please call 435-654-3275.

SAFE DRIVING TIP

The center lane on Main Street is a two way left turning lane. The purpose and function of this lane is to make a left turn or a U-turn. You may legally make a left turn from this lane driving North or South. **You may not use this lane as a merging lane to enter traffic on Main Street.** As you all know Main Street is very busy during school drop off and pick up times and during the morning and evening commute. Instead of using the center lane to merge on to Main Street, try using the side streets to travel North and South until you reach one of the intersections that has a traffic light to make your turn onto Main Street. This is a much safer option and will prevent you from getting a citation for improper use of a turning lane.
